A few days ago I was lucky enough to take part in Project LOOK in Tecate, Baja California, Mexico. This is an international endorsed project of District 4-L4 that began in 1966. I had served on the committee under chairman Lion Joan Parks of Harbor Mesa Lions Club and volunteered in Project LOOK clinics in Tecate, Ensenada and Santa Ana. The current chairman, Dr. Moshen (Moe) Allinaghian, got together a group of dedicated doctors, spouses, assistants and lion volunteers, and off we went. We were able to test 210 needy children, and of those, approximately 185 needed to have glasses. The frames are donated, and funding from donations covers the fabrication of the new lenses. Not used frames or lenses are used in this project. Some doctors return after the main clinic and fit the new eye glasses.

Besides the satisfying feeling that we had served those who need us, we also had a fun time with the Tecate Lions who made us feel so welcome. Talk about combining service with pleasure - isn't that part of being a Lion?

The next few months see an emphasis on the young people in our District. I am looking forward to seeing all the Peace Poster entries and choosing the best one to send to MD4. The Leos are gearing up for their Float decorating day in Pasadena and they are also helping to fill the gaps on the days when some districts might not be able to get enough people. I don't think 4-L4 will have a problem with that. If you want to decorate, contact Lion Jack Tanaka. Our days are Saturday, December 20 (9am-1pm) and Monday, December 29)8am-4pm).

Arrangements for the Teen Recognition celebration are well under way, and in the very capable hands of Lion John Doogan, and of course, our Student Speaker program begins in January/February. All our Leo clubs are continuing to do their outstanding work in helping to serve their local communities. I think the future of our country is in good hands!!

Hearing & Speech Action News

This month I'm going to throw some numbers your way and with al little help, let your do the math!

1. A recent survey by the Better Hearing Institute found 31 million Americans admit to a hearing loss.

2. Only 23% are being are being helped with hearing instruments (7.13 million)

3. Hearing aids are the necessary treatment for 90-95% of the people with hearing loss.

4. The impact of hearing loss on "quality of life" affects nearly every dimension of human experience, including:

- . Physical health
- . Emotional and mental health
- . Others' perception of a person's mental acuity
- . Social skills
- . Family relationships
- . Self-esteem
- . Work and school performance

Hearing loss is shown to negatively impact household income by up to \$12,000.00 per year. However, the use of hearing instruments is shown to mitigate the effects of hearing loss on income by 50%. In total, the annual cost in the United States relative to lost income is estimated to be more than \$100 billion. This study shows that people with mild, moderate or profound losses were all negatively impacted to some extent on virtually every dimension of the human experience.

Why am I telling you all this, when "only" 10-12% of the population are affected with hearing loss? Because these are people we all deal with every day - friends, neighbors, relatives and immediate family members. It has been said that "No man is an island", and we are all affected, for better or worse, by our relationships with others. Mom has to work because Dad's income is inadequate. Kids skip college and miss out on opportunities for real contributions to society. Your brother misunderstood a phone conversation and you are stuck without a ride to church. Now what do we do about all this?

We are Lions, aren't we? We raise money to support Wilderness Camp, and Hearing Aid Bank, sight 7 hearing screening; we recycle hearing aids, don't we? Don't you? And if not - why not?

On a crisp, sunny, Saturday morning in October, many Seal Beach Host Lions and their quests mad their way to the American Legion Yacht club in Newport Beach to support the 19th Annual Sail for the Blind and Visually Impaired event. This is an inspiring project which is sponsored by WORSA (Women's Ocean Racing Association). The all day event provided those individuals either partially or breakfast. totallv visuallv impaired lunch. entertainment and the chance to board a sailing vessel and cruise Newport Beach Harbor!! For some it was the first time being a "deckhand". Our Seal Beach Lion volunteers enjoyed a nice breakfast before we started our service tasks. These included, but were not limited to, some administrative duties, food (breakfast and/or lunch) preparation and delivery; clean up of both and most importantly, escorting each sigh impaired "Guest" to the highlight of this annual event: meeting their skipper and boarding the sailing vessel. Their captain then sails the harbor for approximately two hours. Concurrently, their quide dogs were enjoying some play time running around a fenced in grassy area, fetching toys and romping in their water bowls. Some of our Lions were seen playing with them also. We could have volunteered all day. Most of our Lions spent an average 2 to 5 hours, but generally long enough to have escorted every "deckhand" to their predetermined vessel. Although the majority of these special visually impaired could not appreciate, fully the sights of the harbor, they could hear the sounds of the birds and lapping of the waves, they could feel the movement of the boat and the wind in their hair, the sun on their cheeks. The smiles on their faces said it all. WE SERVE, and community service and giving back takes on many definitions in Lionism. This event will take place again next year: get involved if you can, you will be moved.
