New Lions learn what LAG-ing is all about

This was one of our "cover-up" projects where removal was just not practical. This was Lion Eric Denny and Lion Roger Lange's first project, so we pushed them out front and made them do the heavy lifting (and the dangerous stuff).

We started by painting the sides of two storage containers alongside the bike trail. We helped Lion Eric climb the fence to get some graffiti removed from some power poles near the trail as well.

Next, we tied off some heavy rope to a power pole and rappelled down into a wash near the freeway that is a frequent target of gang graffiti artists. We couldn't get it all but we "ruined" the various messages trying to be conveyed.

Along the way to the next location, we could not help stopping to remove graffiti on road signs, light poles and electrical boxes.

We regrouped near Khoury's and trekked out about halfway down the jetty. Once we found the area most visible from Seal Beach, the team went to work covering graffiti on the giant jetty boulders.

Three hours and about 150 tags later, we ended with a group photo on the jetty that included our Leo-in-Training Ryker Muller.

Besides being an important part of our LAG Team effort, it was a project exclusively for new Lions and their sponsors to get to know each other better.

New Lions in attendance included Roger Lange, Samantha Savage, Eric Denny, Lee Lindquist, Josh Muller and future Lion Barbara Savage.

Project team leaders Ray Longoria and Scott Newton are also new member sponsors for most of these members.

Sight team serves in Imperial, visits Slab City

This was more than a simple sight screening to provide eyeglasses for the needy – it was an amazing testimony to what Lions can do when they pool their resources towards a common goal (and it was quite an adventure).

Lions Diana and Gary Bean & Cathy and Scott Newton took off from Seal Beach on Friday around 3pm. Besides our luggage, we had more than 600 'ready to use' eyeglasses and 500+ eyeglass cases stuffed into the car. We fought traffic and rain but landed in Imperial after a four hour drive. We met up with Lions Scotty & Larry from Rancho Cucamonga and had dinner at amazing Mexican Restaurant.

Early on Saturday, we arrived at the sight location to find hundreds already in line for the clinic. Our 'advance' team helped prepare the sight for the clinic and brief volunteers before the main CLFIS contingent arrived. Once they arrived we were able to mobilize a huge crowd of volunteers to set up and get the clinic up and running by 8:00am. Besides the CLFIS team from various clubs in 4L4 and 4L5, we had Lions from Imperial, El Centro, Blythe, Brawley and Salton Sea plus a great group of young volunteers from Americorps and a local nursing program.

This was an all-hands-on-deck clinic with a nonstop line of patients until nearly 6pm. Throughout the day, the Imperial Lions keep feeding us with homemade breakfast burritos, donuts, snacks and pizza. On day one, we helped more than 480 needy people receive eye exams and recycled eyeglasses.

That evening, we retired to our hotel (Ramada Inn \$50/night) and used the closed restaurant for a banquet celebrating the volun-

teers who served at the clinic. The local Lions cooked an amazing dinner (from scratch) and provided refreshments including some bottles of agave nectar. Every volunteer received a 'Vision Mission' bottle of wine and a goody bag. Door prizes were raffled and almost every volunteer won something. Besides the wonderful generosity, it was a great evening to unwind and share stories of the people we helped earlier in the day.

On Sunday, we left the hotel at 6:55pm and we seeing patients 10 minutes later. We worked non-stop and were able to process another +/- 350 patients by 1:30pm. The vans were packed, we said our goodbyes and were on our way home after providing sight screenings and eyeglasses for more than 830 needy people.

This really was an amazing weekend of service. Besides helping so many people, we made many new friends and enjoyed the wonderful hospitality of the Imperial Lions Club.

On the way home, we took a little detour to Niland, CA where we visited the infamous Slab City and Salvation Mountain. It was a very interesting place to say the least.
