

This months Lion is our President Ray Longoria. Ray was born in a little town in south Texas in the house his grandfather built. He was conceived at the end of WW II in the Francis Drake Hotel in San Francisco. His mother and father were married during WW II and had very little chance for a honeymoon. His mother's trip to San Francisco was the first time she had ever left the town she was born in. Ray spoke Spanish until he was 4 years old and the family moved from Texas to California and his father decided that it would be better if Ray and the other kids grew up without an accent and the family only spoke English after that. Being a child of a military family Ray moved around a lot as a child. He attended Catholic schools for the first 8 years of his education. Ray graduated from high school in New Orleans which explains his love of grits. Having way too much fun in college was the reason for him receiving a pre induction physical notice from his draft board in 1966.

He decided to join the Marine Corps rather than be drafted into the Army much to the disappointment of his Navy father.
